



Go to a meeting of local government and observe. This could be a city council or village board meeting or a meeting of a commission or committee, like a planning and zoning committee. Get a signature from someone to show you were there or take a picture of yourself at the meeting. When done, fill in the table below

Build civil society: Participate in at least one volunteer activity in the community.

Select a community organization that provides service to others and attend a meeting or event as a volunteer. Students have previously volunteered at places like Feed My Starving Children, their former schools, libraries, park district programs and sports teams, shelters, food pantries, and programs through places of worship. The guidelines are that the work should be done for free, the work should not be done for profit by the student or organization, and the work must benefit a group of people.

Don't forget to have an adult who is present sign and give the date and time of your work.

Other types of political action:				
Letter to Editor of Paper, Magazine, Podcast (optional): Write a one page letter to the editor of a publication expressing your position either in support of and in opposition to an issue, preferably one that has been addressed previously in that publication. Be sure that your points are clear and that you have included support for your position. Provide a copy of the letter, including the inside address.				
Make a podcast or public service announcement (PSA).				
Make a poster to create awareness about an issue and put it in a public place.				
Begin a petition or hashtag campaign about an issue of interest to you.				
Prepare a speech and present it in another place another class, cafeteria, some public forum.				
Prepare an informational pamphlet about an issue.				
Meet with a decision-maker and present your information and suggestions.				
Invite a guest and engage in discourse about the issue.				
Initiate an informed conversation with at least three other people. Who and when?				
Design a Facebook or webpage on an issue.				
Design a survey and collect data on an issue.				
Organize an activity to develop awareness of or take action on an issue.				
Organize a group to develop awareness of or take action on an issue.
